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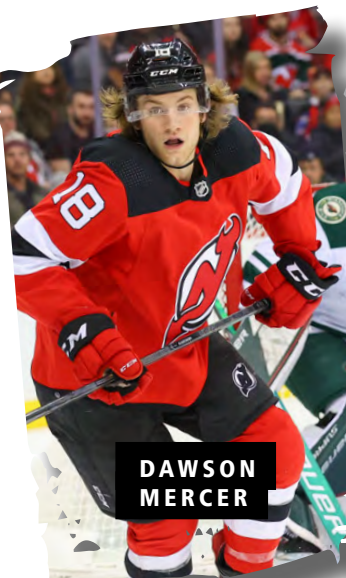

Finding excess value is the goal for every fantasy hockey draft.

Connor McDavid, Leon Draisaitl, and Cale Makar are outstanding players and the opportunity to draft one could make or break your fantasy draft, but they do not offer much potential to exceed their preseason value because their preseason value is already at the top of the league. There is upward mobility, of course, but not relative to the potential value that can occur further down the draft board.

It is the players that do not go at the top of the draft that offer the opportunity find surplus value, players with an opportunity to outperform their draft position, and those are the players that can also make a difference for your fantasy squad.

There are several paths to finding players who might be candidates for the Fantasy All-Star team.

BREAKOUT PERFORMERS

Last season was the highest scoring season since 1995-1996, with an average of 3.11 goals per game for each team. There were 60 players that played at least 50 games and scored more than 0.90 points per game in 2021-2022. That list included the likes of Tyler Bertuzzi, Nick Schmaltz, Chris Kreider, Jesper Bratt, Dylan Larkin, Timo Meier, and Jordan Kyrou – players that were exceeding their previous levels of production. Successfully hitting on a few of those players can change the trajectory of your fantasy team.

BOUNCING BACK FROM INJURY

One of the factors that will drop a player's draft value is uncertainty that comes when a player is returning from injury. It can be

tough to trust that a player who missed significant time in a season will suddenly be healthy, but that is where the value proposition exists. If the injuries are not chronic, maybe all it takes is a healthy season for a player to reach his potential.

PLAYING PERCENTAGES

Over the years we have learned that statistical aberrations tend not to hold, so if a player typically scores on 12% of his shots on goal, but suddenly scores on 7% one season, the most likely scenario, all things being equal, is that he will rebound to his career norms. Same goes for on-ice shooting percentage – how a player's linemates finish when he is on the ice. Players coming off seasons with low percentages are prime value plays.

NEW OPPORTUNITIES

These can come if a player changes teams but even while remaining on the same team a player might move up the depth chart, get better linemates, see more power play time. These are all considerations related to why a player might be able to surpass expectations with their production.

Dylan Larkin, Jesper Bratt, Jared McCann, Rasmus Dahlin, and Noah Dobson were among the Fantasy All-Stars to pay the biggest dividends last season. Here are the Fantasy All-Stars for the 2022-2023 season, players that should be able to offer excess value relative to where they are selected.

Hitting on a few of these players will give your team a better shot at taking home a fantasy championship.

FANTASY ALL-STARS

FORWARDS

JACK HUGHES, C, NEW JERSEY

This is not digging deep on the sleeper scale to suggest the No. 1 overall pick in the 2019 Draft, but Hughes has not had a full breakout season just yet. He was on his way last season, putting up 56 points in 49 games, including 48 points in 36 games after Christmas. The Devils have been upgrading their supporting cast and 21-year-old Hughes has shown marked improvement in three NHL seasons. If he can stay healthy this year, 100 points is not out of the question.

JAKUB VRANA, LW, DETROIT

Limited to just 26 games last season as he recovered from shoulder surgery, Vrana has scored 21 goals in 37 games for the Red Wings since he was acquired from the Washington Capitals. He has scored on 21.6% of his shots on goal with Detroit, so that is not going to last, but a full season for Vrana, with an improving supporting cast around him, should set him up for the most productive season of his career.

TYLER TOFFOLI, RW, CALGARY

Traded from Montreal to Calgary last season, Toffoli finished with 49 points in 74 games, his most since 2015-2016, when he played for Los Angeles. He is 30 years old and yet still offers potential value this season because he just might get the opportunity to play with Jonathan Huberdeau on the Flames' top line. Huberdeau elevated the production of his linemates in Florida, including former Flames center Sam Bennett, and could very well do the same for Toffoli in Calgary.

BOONE JENNER, C, COLUMBUS

Despite never scoring 50 points in an NHL season, Jenner has offered fantasy value because of a decent shot rate that leads to goals, and he has had five seasons with more than 150 hits, so he fills in some peripheral categories, too. Jenner just might get a chance to center a line with Columbus' big free agent acquisition, Johnny Gaudreau. If that happens, then Jenner will have more scoring opportunities than ever before.



ARTURI LEHKONEN

ARTURI LEHKONEN, LW, COLORADO

Traded from Montreal to Colorado last season, the 27-year-old winger was an integral part of the Avalanche Stanley Cup victory. Not only did Lehkonen play a bigger role in Colorado, finishing with 19 goals and 38 points last season, both career highs, he then went on to contribute eight goals and 14 points in 20 playoff games. Now Lehkonen seems set for a second-line role with power play time on an elite team.

SEAN COUTURIER, C, PHILADELPHIA

Back surgery sidelined the Flyers center after 29 games last season and even though he had solid shot rates (2.72 shots per game), Couturier scored on just 7.6% of his shots, his lowest shooting percentage since 2012-2013, and his on-ice shooting percentage of 6.0% was the lowest of his career. If Couturier is healthy and the percentages bounce back, Couturier's point totals could get back on track.

SETH JARVIS, RW, CAROLINA

The Carolina Hurricanes were so good last season that they could ease Jarvis into the lineup. The rookie winger had 20 points in his first 46 games, playing 13:19 per game, but as the season progressed, Jarvis earned a bigger role and he finished the regular season with 20 points in his last 22 games, playing 15:03 per game in that stretch, with a regular spot on the Hurricanes' top line. It is entirely fair to expect the 20-year-old to continue his career ascent in Year 2.

BRENDAN GALLAGHER, RW, MONTREAL

After scoring seven goals and 24 points in 56 games last season, it is a good time to buy low on the crease-crashing Canadiens winger who has two 30-goal seasons to his credit. Gallagher scored on just 4.9% of his shots last season, easily the worst mark of his career, even though he ranked eighth in high danger shot attempts per 60 minutes among players to play at least 500 5-on-5 minutes. The Canadiens should be better than they were last season and Gallagher can bring much more to the table than he did in 2021-2022.

LAWSON CROUSE, LW, ARIZONA

The 25-year-old power forward scored a career-high 20 goals and 34 points last season, even though a broken hand limited him to 65 games. Crouse has also recorded at least 150 hits in four consecutive seasons and given the state of the Coyotes depth chart, there is not much competition for ice time, so Crouse ought to have ample opportunity to play an elevated role. With enough offensive production, Crouse's hit totals can make a difference.

ALEXIS LAFRENIERE, LW, N.Y. RANGERS

The top pick in the 2020 Draft, Lafreniere has not set the league ablaze, but that is in large part due to lack of power play production. 50 of his 52 career points have come at even strength and his 31 even-strength goals in the past two seasons is tied for 66th in the league – the same number as Claude Giroux, one more than John Tavares. There is an opportunity for Lafreniere to move up the Rangers' depth chart this season and with any kind of improvement on the power play, his production could spike.



ALEXIS LAFRENIERE

PHIL KESSEL, RW, VEGAS

He will turn 35 before the season starts and has not missed a game since the 2009-2010 season, but Kessel also scored just eight goals last season while scoring on a career-low 4.6% of his shots on goal. Moving to a competitive Vegas team ought to keep Kessel motivated and they will need him to provide secondary offense. Given his age and last season's scoring woes, he should be a late-round bargain.

CASEY MITTELSTADT, C, BUFFALO

Progress has been uneven for the eighth pick in the 2017 Draft, as he has managed 80 points in 195 career games. How is that possibly going to lead to him making a difference this season? He did score on a career-low 7.6% of his shots on goal last season and is still considered skilled enough to have an opportunity to play on a scoring line and the power play for the Sabres. He is a late-round consideration, and maybe only for deep leagues, but there is a chance that Mittelstadt bursts through with more production than he has ever had in an NHL season which, at this point, has topped out at 25 points.

FANTASY PROSPECTS RANKINGS

When preparing for a fantasy draft or evaluating prospects for a trade in your fantasy league you need to understand the difference between rankings, and fantasy rankings.

The difference can be subtle, or significant depending on your leagues scoring and format. Generally speaking, fantasy rankings are based on projected point production. I have found that the vast majority of readers that read and follow my work are in dynasty keeper leagues with peripheral stats, or bangers leagues.

The following rankings are based on projected point production and include added value to players that can contribute other stats, such as hits, blocks, PIM's and faceoff wins.

In fantasy hockey, we have a limited number of prospect roster spots and as such I put higher value on prospects that have a quicker ETA to the NHL or have superstar upside.

This will help you identify the top 30 forwards, 20 defencemen and ten goalies to target in your fantasy leagues.

To be considered a prospect, skaters must be under 26-years-old, and have played in under 60 career games, or less than 35 in a single season. For goalies, less than 30 games played, or 15 in a single season.

MASON MCTAVISH

1. MATTY BENIERS, C – SEATTLE KRAKEN

The Kraken are poised to get an offensive boost this coming season with the additions of Andre Burakovsky and Oliver Bjorkstrand. Those two new wingers will be centered by the Krakens first ever draft pick Matty Beniers, who finishing the season in the NHL scoring nine points in the final ten games. Beniers is a Calder favorite.

2. MARCO ROSSI, C – MINNESOTA WILD

I projected Rossi to make the Wild after his draft in 2020, but he lost a year of development to COVID. He returned last year in the AHL and is now poised to crack a top six with the Wild. Another Calder favorite.

3. COLE PERFETTI, C/LW – WINNIPEG JETS

Thanks to the pandemic, Perfetti now has two seasons of pro development, and the 20-year-old is NHL ready to take a top six role with the Jets. "Goal" Perfetti could develop into a 40-goal scorer.

4. MASON MCTAVISH, C – ANAHEIM DUCKS

The power forward played nine games to start the season with the Ducks before returning to junior to lead Hamilton to an OHL championship. In multi-cat leagues, McTavish will check all the boxes, points, PP points, hits, FOW, he will do it all.

5. KENT JOHNSON, C – COLUMBUS BLUE JACKETS

Johnson may start on the wing, and may not offer much in peripheral stats, but he will rack up points early and often in his career. If Johnson can lock down a top six center role, he will have either or both Patrick Laine and Johnny Gaudreau on his wing.

6. ALEXANDER HOLTZ, RW – NEW JERSEY DEVILS

The Swedish sniper scored 26 goals and 51 points in the AHL as a rookie. He only had two points in nine NHL games, but he is poised to secure a top six role with the Devils. He is a future 30 goal scorer.

7. QUINTON BYFIELD, C – LA KINGS

Bigger players can take a little longer to develop and the Kings are taking their time with Byfield. The big, smooth skating center can evolve into a dominant NHL first line center, and a dominant multi-cat fantasy asset as well. This one may take a few years yet, but he will be well worth the wait.

8. JACK QUINN, RW – BUFFALO SABRES

I was very critical of the Sabres selecting Quinn ahead of Rossi in the 2020 draft. I still am, but Quinn has been excellent since then dominating the AHL. The gap between the two may be indistinguishable when all is said and done. Quinn is a blue-chip prospect.

9. SHANE WRIGHT, C – SEATTLE KRAKEN

The projected number one prospect in the 2022 Draft fell to fourth. It lit a fire in him and falling to Seattle may be the best thing for him as he has less competition to make the roster. Wright could make Montreal regret passing him by.

10. WILLIAM EKLUND, LW – SAN JOSE SHARKS

Eklund nearly made the Sharks out of his draft but was sent back to the SHL for one more year of development. Eklund will make the team this year and be a top six winger with Calder aspirations.

11. JURAJ SLAFKOVSKY, LW – MONTREAL CANADIENS

The first overall pick in the 2022 draft may start in the NHL, but will need Mike Hoffman and Jonathan Drouin to falter to allow an opportunity for Slafkovsky to step in. As he showed in the World Championship and Olympics, he is up for the task.

12. NICK ROBERTSON, LW – TORONTO MAPLE LEAFS

Injuries limited him to just 28 AHL games last year, but he managed 28 points. The Leafs need cap friendly roster players and Robertson could step into a top six role on the high-octane offensive Leafs roster out of training camp.

13. DYLAN GUENTHER, LW/RW – ARIZONA COYOTES

Guenther torched the WHL with a 91-point season and has one more year of junior eligibility to play. Their will be some more wait time before he is lighting NHL goal lamps, but his upside is tremendous.

14. SHANE PINTO, C – OTTAWA SENATORS

Pinto looked to be a lock for 2C, but injuries ended his season after just five games. If he can stay healthy, he would be third line centre at worst providing points, hits, and FOW.

15. LUKAS REICHEL, LW – CHICAGO BLACKHAWKS

The German winger was excellent as a rookie in the AHL and showed he is NHL ready. The Hawks are rebuilding, and he is a part of their future. Reichel will see ice time in the NHL and as the Hawks continue to ship out veterans for futures, his role will increase.

CALDER TROPHY CANDIDATES

**1. OWEN POWER –
BUFFALO SABRES**

As we saw at the end of last year when Power turned pro, he is going to step right into a key role on the Buffalo Sabres blueline. In his eight games last season, Power averaged over 22 minutes per game and played in all situations. If Power can secure a spot on Buffalo's powerplay and put up the kind of numbers that he is capable of, he could easily be a Calder front runner.

**2. MATTHEW BENIERS –
SEATTLE KRACEN**

Another former Michigan star who was an immediate standout upon turning pro at the end of last year, Beniers may already be Seattle's most talented offensive player. The numbers (in a small sample size) spoke for themselves as he was just under a point per game through 10 contests. He is going to get all the ice time he can handle and has a real chance to be the highest scoring rookie in the NHL this season.

**3. KENT JOHNSON –
COLUMBUS BLUE JACKETS**

Even with the addition of Johnny Gaudreau, the expectation is that Johnson has a real chance to be a top six forward and powerplay presence for the Blue Jackets this season. His game has improved considerably in the last calendar year, and he should be ready to be an immediate impact player.

**4. MASON MCTAVISH –
ANAHEIM DUCKS**

Is Anaheim truly rebuilding? They may be operating near the cap floor, but they also brought in Klingberg, Ryan Strome, and Frank Vatrano this offseason to support a collection of great young talent. McTavish already got his cup of coffee to start last season and may have stuck had he not gotten injured. This year, he seems like a lock to make the roster. It's just a matter of how much ice time and powerplay time he gets.

**5. JACK QUINN –
BUFFALO SABRES**

Without question, Quinn was one of the AHL's best players last year. As a result, he has emerged as one of the top forward prospects on the planet. It seems pretty likely that Buffalo will give him a spot in the lineup this year, but just how much responsibility he gets remains to be seen with some other talented wingers already in the lineup.

**6. MARCO ROSSI –
MINNESOTA WILD**

After a strong first pro season, Rossi seems well positioned to earn a spot in Minnesota's top nine this season. Moving out Kevin Fiala certainly opened up a spot, even if they play different positions. Maybe the Wild ease him in as a third line pivot behind Eriksson Ek and Hartman, but there's also plenty of opportunity available to him to get a ton of ice time with good wingers. Much like Quinn (these two seem to be forever linked), he could have a big year if he gets enough ice time.

7. JAKE SANDERSON – OTTAWA SENATORS

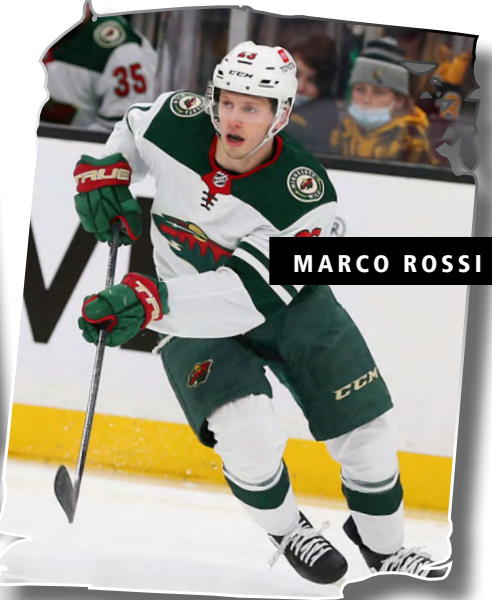
A hand injury prevented Sanderson from making his debut after signing late last season. This same hand injury prevented him from participating in Senators development camp. Will he be healthy enough to start the year? It seems likely and if so, much like Owen Power, there's not a lot holding Sanderson back from being an immediate top four defender and someone who sees ice time in every situation. The other question is, will he produce enough offensively to be a Calder candidate?

8. VITALI KRAVTSOV – NEW YORK RANGERS

We've done this dance before. Kravtsov was supposed to be one of the top Calder candidates heading into last year. But he struggled to start and returned to Russia for the bulk of the year, before returning again to close out the season in the NHL. His 20 games played makes him barely still eligible for the Calder this season, but the immensely talented winger should be more confident this time around when he tries to crack the top nine yet again.

9. JURAJ SLAFKOVSKY – MONTREAL CANADIENS

The reigning first overall selection in the NHL Draft is usually a slam dunk candidate to be a Calder favourite. For the second year in a row (after Power returned to college last year), we're not even sure that the recent first overall pick plays immediately in the NHL. Slafkovsky will be given every chance to crack Montreal's roster and he very well could be an imme-

diately impact player (as his international success may have proven last year), but there's also a chance that he returns to Europe for another year of seasoning.

10. SHANE WRIGHT – SEATTLE KRACEN

Will there be a single player from the 2022 NHL Draft in the NHL this year? It's no slam dunk...but Slafkovsky and Wright have the best odds and opportunity. If Wright comes into Seattle camp and proves that he is ready to be an NHL player, he will make the roster and would be set up to put up some points (similar to the aforementioned Beniers). If not, he will be sent back to the OHL for another season after last year's somewhat indifferent performance.

11. WILLIAM EKLUND – SAN JOSE SHARKS

After a strong start to his NHL career (in a limited audition to start last year), Eklund's development stalled upon returning to Sweden, much to the disappointment of many. This coming year, there's not much blocking Eklund from significant ice time and responsibility on a rebuilding Sharks team. Hopefully he bounces back strong.

12. COLE PERFETTI – WINNIPEG JETS

After two years in the AHL, it's definitely time for Perfetti to take that next step as a permanent fixture in Winnipeg's top nine. He got into 18 games last year with mixed results. With no more Paul Stastny or Andrew Copp, there is an opening on a scoring line. If Perfetti can grab a hold of that, he could have a really nice statistical season.

13. ALEXANDER HOLTZ – NEW JERSEY DEVILS

Holtz was incredible in the AHL last year, his first season in North America. On talent alone, he should be higher on this list. But how much of an opportunity is there for Holtz to be an impact player for New Jersey full time this season? The Devils brought in Ondrej Palat and Erik Haula to an already talented forward group. If Holtz can work his way in, he could have a big year, but it will be tough.

One of the keys to a champion dynasty team in fantasy hockey is finding value in the draft.

Cherry-picking blue chip prospects in the early rounds is easy and requires little to no homework. Knowing who to pick after the mid rounds while others are frantically flipping through pick lists and magazines is when you can separate yourself from the pack.

Each year there is an influx of new fantasy prospects that have the potential to deliver early round points in the final rounds of your draft. These imports can come from Europe or the NCAA, or some late blooming prospects poised for a breakout. To help give you a competitive edge in your fantasy league, here are some of the prospects that could prove to be gems, mined in the late, late rounds.



ANDREI KUZMENKO

COMING TO AMERICA – EUROPEAN IMPORTS

ANDREY KUZMENKO, LW – VANCOUVER CANUCKS

It seems each year there is at least one import from the KHL that has a high profile and fantasy GM's scramble to acquire. Artemi Panarin set the bar as an undrafted free agent and since then the likes of Vladimir Tkachev, Vladimir Shipachyov and Nikita Gusev have failed to deliver. Kuzmenko is a dynamic offensive forward that was second in KHL scoring in 2021-22 season. He is speedy, and shifty and deceptive. Will his skill translate to the NHL? If it does, he will be a top six winger and very fantasy relevant. If not, he will have no impact whatsoever.

DENIS MALGIN, C – TORONTO MAPLE LEAFS

Malgin may be a familiar name as he returns to the NHL where he played a total of 192 games with Florida. He spent the past two seasons in the Swiss league and got NHL scouts attention recently at the Olympics and World Championship where he scored 12 points in eight games. He is

penciled in for the Leafs third line center position where the 25-year-old has the high skill level, and low cap hit the Leafs are looking for.

ANTON LEVTCHI, LW – FLORIDA PANTHERS

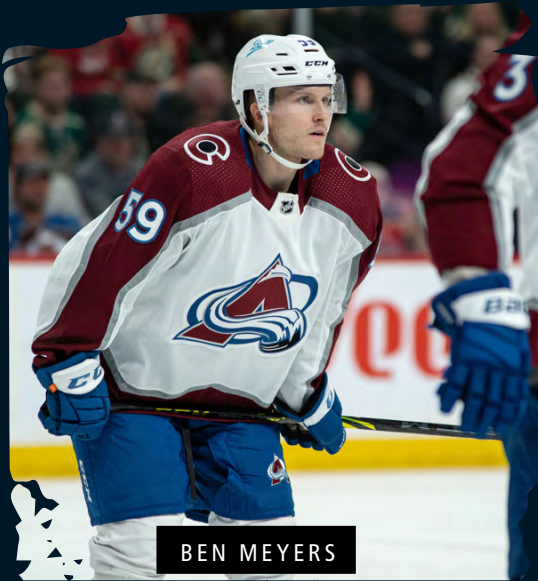
With the Matthew Tkachuk trade dominating all the headlines, Levtschi is flying under the radar. He is coming in hot on the heels of leading the Liiga in scoring with 61 points, winning the Golden Helmet (MVP) and leading Tappara to a Championship. He has his work cut out to crack the Panthers roster, but the 26-year-old could be a money sleeper pick if he does.

MARKUS NURMI, LW/RW – NASHVILLE PREDATORS

The 6-5 Finn had two solid seasons in the Liiga with TPS and had a breakout playoff with 19 points in 18 games. The former Sens draft pick has signed his ELC with the Predators and will make the move to North America. He should see some time in the AHL but should also get at least a cup of coffee in the NHL, and if he shows well, he could stick.

TOP OF THE CLASS – NCAA IMPORTS

BEN MEYERS, C/LW – COLORADO AVALANCHE

Meyers is the top of this list with a bullet. He had a dominant senior campaign in the NCAA and was a Hobey Baker finalist. He played some regular season games in the NHL at the end of the season, but his contract did not allow him to play in the playoffs, so he got more international experience at the World Championships. The 24-year-old will step right into a roster spot with the Avalanche and with Nazem Kadri departing as a free agent, it could open the door for Meyers.

NICK BLANKENBURG, D – COLUMBUS BLUE JACKETS

Blankenburg was the unsung hero on the vaunted Michigan Wolverines roster. Insulated from the limelight behind mega stars Owen Power and Luke Hughes, Blankenburg provided veteran stability to the roster. Blankenburg will offer more value to the bangers leagues as he will offer some offensive upside along with a blend of hits and blocks.

BRANDON BUSSI, G – BOSTON BRUINS

After four years at Western Michigan University, he is ready to turn pro after a 26-12-1 record. Bussi got into five AHL games to end the season and looked right at home with a 3-2-0 record including a shutout. Bussi is more of a long shot, and the 24-year-old could still need a year or two of AHL development before he is ready for the Bruins.

DRYDEN MCKAY, G – TORONTO MARLIES

While he has not signed an NHL contract, McKay has signed an AHL contract with the Toronto Marlies. This is a big gamble and a curious file to keep an eye on. Named after legendary netminder Ken Dryden, McKay had legendary NCAA career stats. He closed his career with an NCAA Championship and won the Hobey Baker Award. The concerns are his height, and limited shot volume he faced with Minnesota. The Toronto prospect depth in goal is very questionable and it is very possible for McKay to step in, dominate at the AHL level immediately and by mid season find himself in the Leafs crease if Matt Murray and Ilya Samsonov fail to deliver. It's long shot sure, but its possible.

LATE BLOOMERS – ROOKIES

NATHAN SMITH, C – ARIZONA COYOTES

The Winnipeg Jets draft selection had a banner season posting 50 points in his junior season in Mankato, then playing for USA at the Olympics posting two points in four games. He finished the season in the NHL posting four points in ten games with the Coyotes. He should step right into a top six role on the lowly Coyotes while they continue to turn over the roster for their latest rebuild.

LOGAN THOMPSON, G – LAS VEGAS GOLDEN KNIGHTS

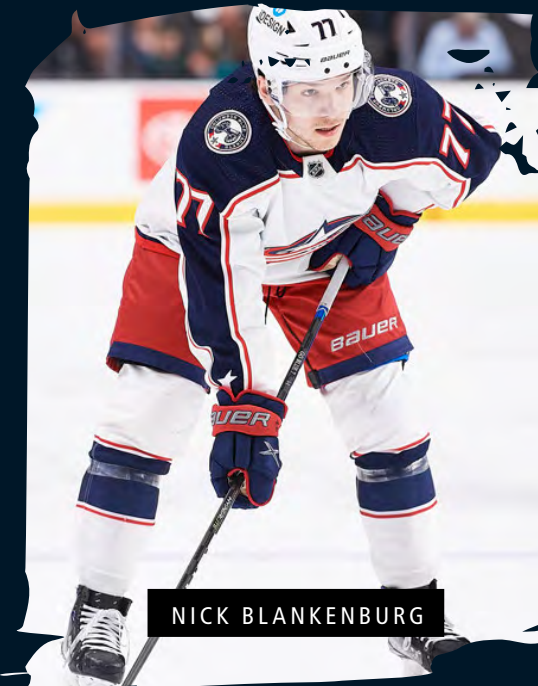
The 25-year-old undrafted netminder had a breakout season posting a 13-9-5 record in the AHL. Injuries on the Golden Knights roster opened the door for him to play 19 NHL games where he performed well with a 10-5-3 record. With the news that Robin Lehner will miss the entire season, Thompson becomes the Knights starting goalie.

NICK CICEK, LD – SAN JOSE SHARKS

The former Portland Winterhawks defender went undrafted, signed an AHL deal and scored 25 points and 62 PIMS in 53 games with the Barracuda. His play with the Barracuda earned him an NHL contract with the sharks. His fantasy upside is limited to the deeper multi-cat leagues where he can contribute hits, blocks, PIM's and some points.

ARBER XHEKAJ, LD – MONTREAL CANADIENS

The 6-4, 225-pound defender went undrafted in both the OHL and the NHL and yet has played his way into an NHL contract. He dominated the OHL as an over age on the Hamilton Bulldogs blueline and helped lead Hamilton to the Memorial Cup. The 21-year-old will make his pro debut in Laval may take some time to get to the NHL. His offensive upside is limited, but he could be a monster in multi-cat leagues in the footsteps of Radko Gudas.

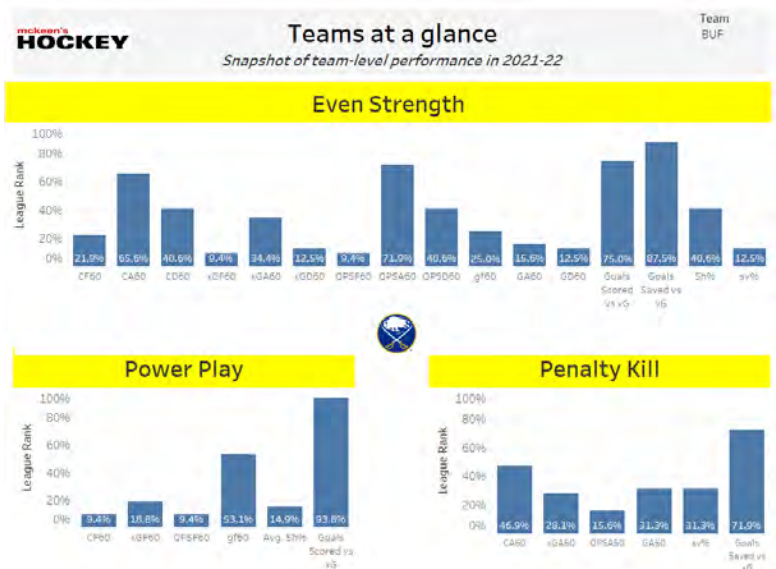

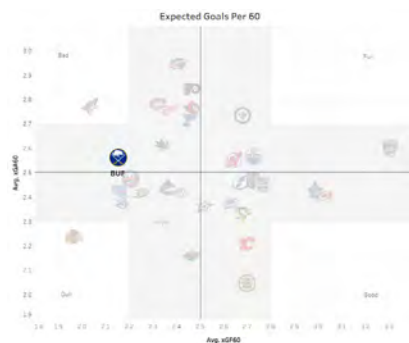
TEAM AT-A-GLANCE

TEAM: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

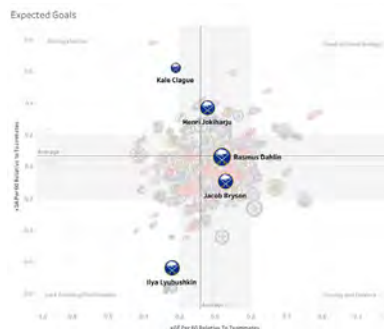

DEFENSE: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

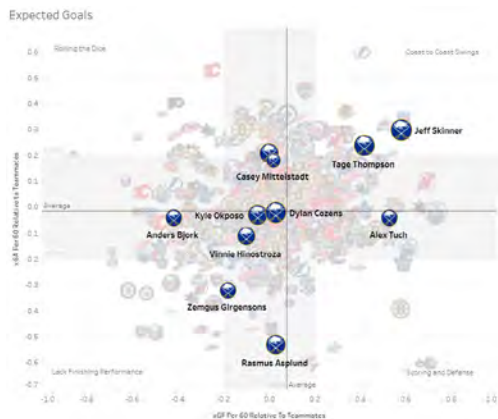

FORWARDS: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

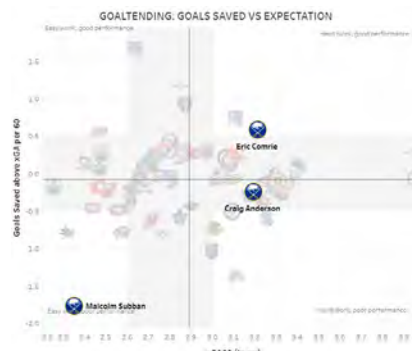

Trading Eichel to Vegas hurt, but Alex Tuch injected offensive spark when returning to the lineup following the trade. The foundation to build up front at the top end exists, but offensive support from lower roster forwards is deeply missing.

As breakout seasons go, perhaps none were more out-of-the-blue and stunning as Tage Thompson's 38-goal, 68-point year in 2020-2021 all while playing a position he hadn't played in the NHL. Coach Don Granato moved Thompson to center and watched the six-foot-seven score more than twice as many goals in one season as he did in his first four with Buffalo and St. Louis. Thompson going from a player you wondered if he would ever pop off in the NHL to suddenly being the Sabres No. 1 center without a doubt is an incredible glow-up. Thompson's rise to the top of the line-chart saw him team up with Jeff Skinner and Alex Tuch to provide the Sabres' first dangerous top line since Skinner skated next to Jack Eichel and Sam Reinhart. Of his 38 goals, 26 came at even strength and 10 on the power play. Adding a couple of shorthanded tallies was a chef's kiss on top of an incredible season. On top of that, Thompson trailed only Skinner in shots taken and he was fourth among six players on the roster to have a greater than 50 percent CorsiFor at 5-on-5 last season. The Sabres believe he can do it again and signed him to a seven-year, \$50 million contract prior to training camp.

Jeff Skinner's Sabres career has been an incredible journey and he just finished his fourth season in Buffalo. After he scored 40 in his first season and landed an eight-year, \$72 million contract his following two seasons had him buried in the lineup by then coach Ralph Krueger and his offense disappeared posting the worst seasons of his career in back-to-back years. With Krueger out and Don Granato in, Skinner found himself back on the top line and thrived. Skinner finished second on the Sabres behind Tage Thompson in goals (33) and points (63). As he's done throughout his career, he thrived at even strength scoring 28 goals and his time on the power play increased greatly and led to five goals. Having

a player with the offensive ability of Skinner made it seem like a no-brainer to put him with other players who can drive play and teaming up with Thompson and Alex Tuch helped make everyone better. Skinner's ice time even recovered to a normal level as his average per game jumped by 2:35. What Skinner will look to avoid is the roller coaster effect he's had year to year going from a big goal season to a more average one. After breaking free of the restrictions of the past, Skinner will aim to keep the good times rolling.

It's not often when a player is traded for a superstar that he turns into the breath of fresh air needed to give a team life. This was the story for Alex Tuch after arriving in Buffalo from Vegas in the Jack Eichel trade. Tuch embraced being a Sabre as he was a fan of them growing up outside of Syracuse, NY and impressed fans in Western New York with his big frame he uses to drive the net and create opportunities close to the net. Tuch returned from offseason shoulder surgery to play 50 games for Buffalo and posted 12 goals and 38 points tying him for fifth with Dylan Cozens on the team. Tuch teaming up with Jeff Skinner and Tage Thompson on the top line for most of the season allowed him to be the power forward while Thompson and Skinner thrived with the room he provided. Tuch's scoring rate of 0.76 points per-game was also a career high and his best since 2018-2019 with the Golden Knights. He was second on the Sabres behind Rasmus

Asplund with a 51.6 percent CorsiFor at 5-on-5 and when you've got the puck more than the opponent does, you're doing it right. Tuch also showed characteristics of being a possible future captain of the team, if not this season, then certainly down the road. With a complete offseason of training and a full season, it should mean the best is yet to come for Tuch.

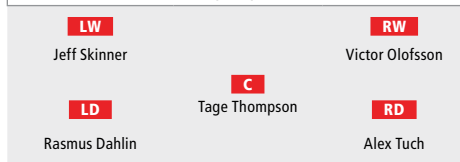

Victor Olofsson has one of the best shots in the NHL and he found ways to grow his game when his shot wasn't there. For a span of time that's somewhat unclear, Olofsson dealt with a wrist injury that appeared to take the speed and accuracy away from his laser beam of a shot and held him to 20 goals. Although he missed only 10 games, having his best weapon unavailable for any amount of time would be frustrating. Consider that he scored on 12.2% of his shots last season, a normal season would've meant scoring closer to 25 or 30 goals. The last time the Sabres had more than two 30-goal scorers in a season was 2006-2007 when they had four. Watching Olofsson evolve into a player who can do more than just score laser beam goals on the power play to one who can set up others and score for himself is a very welcome change. This isn't to say Olofsson's play ever disappointed the front office, but when you add more to a player's game that can make them a better threat and keep opposing defenses on their toes, it makes a difference. This evolution in his game shows

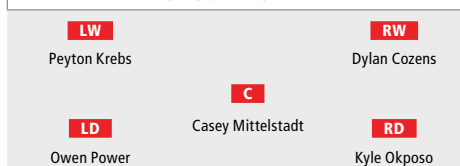

It's true that many forwards who excel defensively fly under the radar unless they're also outstanding scorers. After all, doing the grunt work doesn't usually get on the highlight reels. But when you did through the numbers and search out players whose possession and shot suppression numbers look, perhaps no one went as unnoticed as Rasmus Asplund. At 5-on-5, Asplund was the Sabres best at CorsiFor percentage (53.3), he trailed only Alex Tuch in Shots For percentage and expected goals for percentage. Even more impressive is that he had most of his zone starts in the offensive end. Asplund is not an offensive dynamo. He had eight goals and 27 points and 22 of those were at even strength. He went 46 games between goals, when he scored Nov. 21 and not again until March 27, but his defensive work earned him a few votes for the Selke Trophy for best defensive forward. Given his defensive abilities, he'll likely be deployed on an energy line or will line up with other players whose main skills are not centered around shutting down opponents. That Asplund has emerged like this gives Buffalo someone they can rely on to forecheck and pressure the puck relentlessly all over the ice and to play smart on the penalty kill. If Asplund were better at finishing he'd have a few more goals as he can generate chances, but for now it's not his main mission.

It would feel wrong to say that Dahlin has been a bit beleaguered in his four NHL seasons, but there's a lot of truth to it. He's played for three head coaches, each with different systems and ideas for how Dahlin should play, and it's hurt him, particularly early on in seasons. Last season started similarly as the player who went No. 1 in the 2018 NHL Draft seemed like he

would never show up. But that changed in the second half of the year. Dahlin became a puck-rushing force, particularly in the offensive zone. Dahlin's moments to pinch in were well-timed, his reads on plays were spot on, and his ability to finish chances improved as the season wound down. He had 13 goals and 40 assists when it was all said and done, and it seemed like the new energy surrounding the team manifested itself within his game. Ten of his goals came at even strength, as did 21 assists. On the power play which he was the quarterback on the top unit, he scored three goals with 18 assists and even had a shorthanded assist as well. He played the most minutes per game in his career (over 24:01) and was hands-down their No. 1 defenseman. These are key reasons to be excited about what's to come this season, all he must do is not stumble out of the gate and play like that for a full season. It's a big ask, but it's the ask that's always been made of him from the beginning.

That blocked shot kept him out of action for some time and meant he started the season in the AHL when he was cleared to play. It wasn't long after that he was off to Buffalo where he instantly became a top pairing defender with Rasmus Dahlin and made Buffalo's blue line that much better. Over 42 games, Samuelsson had 10 assists and averaged an even 20 minutes per game. While he played most his minutes with Casey Fitzgerald to start, his time with Dahlin is what has everyone in Buffalo excited about what's to come. In 140 minutes of time at 5-on-5 with Dahlin, he posted a 54.6 percent CorsiFor and a 51.3 percent expected goals for. Even with all that, there was some bad luck as their PDO together was .967 (average is 1.000). Samuelsson also provides a physical element to the roster that's severely lacking. He was third on the team with 100 hits. Dahlin was first with 121 but he played in 38 more games. The best is yet to come for Samuelsson, and he'll be counted on to play top pairing minutes, likely with Dahlin. His throwback style with a modern twist is the exact kind of thing Buffalo has needed for a long time.

A lot had been asked of Jokiharju in his first couple seasons with Buffalo. He was originally Rasmus Dahlin's partner and stayed there for a few seasons. The importance of that pairing playing most minutes and being tasked the toughest matchups began to show that perhaps that wasn't the ideal role for the now 23-year-old Finn. Now that Mattias Samuelsson has assumed that role on the top pairing, Jokiharju has slid back to the second pair where, while the minutes are fewer, it's allowed Jokiharju to settle in and take better advantage of the lesser matchups. What that really means is it's a long-winded way of saying Jokiharju was fine but unspectacular. His numbers, both standard and advanced, don't jump off the screen. He had three goals and 19 points in 60 games and his possession numbers were middle of the road both in terms of the Sabres and in general. He had some power play time and a bit more on the penalty kill, although it stands to reason with Owen Power's full-time arrival, power play time will be scarce for Jokiharju from here on out. What will make or break him is how steady and consistent he can play.

There were stretches last season where his play was a bit off and left fans frustrated. Saving him from top pairing minutes should do well to eliminate that from occurring and allow Buffalo to get the best from him. True defensive-defensemen are a bit scarcer in the modern NHL, but when there's a need for one on a team it's always apparent. Therefore, one of the Sabres few free agent signings addressed that need for the blue line and it was former Coyote and Maple Leaf defender Ilya Lyubushkin that fit the bill. While Mattias Samuelsson provides a lot of that bite on the top pair, Lyubushkin will provide another option on a lower pairing. One thing that makes Lyubushkin stand out is his consistency. The player he was when he came up with Arizona is the same guy he is now.

His shot suppression numbers were decent with Arizona considering how poorly they've played the past few seasons. In his short time with the Maple Leafs, those numbers naturally improved but his game held strong. He's not a big time shot blocker nor is he overwhelmingly physical, but at 6-foot-2, 210 pounds he can fill the space and close the gaps with attention to detail. If there's someone Lyubushkin seems ideal to line up next to it's Owen Power. His defensive-minded play counters Power's strong puck carrying ability and offensive play. That's a spot he may have to compete with Jokiharju to lock down. Make no mistake though, Lyubushkin is a Sabre because he can handle himself very well in his own end of the ice, anything else he can add is gravy.

It seems like Craig Anderson just doesn't want to quit – at 41-years old, he'll be one of the oldest players in the league, much less in net. With the announcement that Mike Smith will likely miss the 2022-23 campaign, that leaves Anderson as the league's only over-40 goaltender – and the next closest in age, Marc-Andre Fleury, will only be 38. It's hard not to root for him to keep having fun, especially given the mentor status he'll assume during the upcoming year. Buffalo found itself scrambling when former up-and-comer Linus Ullmark left in free agency last summer, and they still haven't quite recovered. That leaves

them in a position where they need Anderson for as long as he's happy to skate out and dress the part, even if his numbers during the 2021-22 season were far from exemplary. He remains one of the league's most old-school holdouts from a technical standpoint, which becomes more and more apparent with each passing year; as the game speeds up and requires faster and smoother lateral work, he struggles to keep up. But despite the fact that his game clearly doesn't seem suited for going the distance on a postseason run anymore, he continues to have one of the most consistent game styles out there. That's an incredible asset for a Buffalo franchise that's not necessarily trying to win a cup this year but is trying to ingrain good habits in the up-and-coming players they have on roster. Add in the guidance that Anderson can provide for the newly-acquired Eric Comrie and the stable reliability he offers for the team's coaching staff as a backup, and there's a lot to like about his continued presence in the Niagara region – even if he signifies yet another year of a seemingly-endless rebuild.

It seems like Eric Comrie has been just a step away from regular league action for years now, but he'll

finally get his chance this season. With Malcolm Subban on the injured reserve list, Ukko-Pekka Luukkonen coming off a lackluster year spent nearly

entirely in the AHL, and Erik Portillo still developing at the University of Michigan, the door is wide open for Comrie to finally establish himself as a consistent NHL presence. Comrie had a stellar coming-out year for Winnipeg this past season, posting his first career NHL shutout and boasting a .920 save percentage in all situations through 19 games. It seemed as if he finally took the technical precision he was so well known for during his prospect years and added a bit more confident from a decision-making standpoint. During some of his brief earlier showings at the NHL level, he struggled with keeping his movements fluid and minimal after allowing a tough goal. This past year, though, he managed to keep his game consistent through entire 60-minute showings, relying on smart technique and a lack of over-aggressive challenging to give himself an edge in a season where so many goaltenders were still re-establishing their own game baselines post-covid shutdowns. Now, though, he'll have to replicate that success with what's likely to be a much higher workload, behind a team that's dealt with far less success than Winnipeg has seen in the last few years. Buffalo has struggled with not just structure to their games, but with consistency – particularly in how they manage their blue line. That means that although Comrie is going to be given more responsibility, he'll be given less direction in how to handle it. Hopefully, he'll be fine with Craig Anderson as a reliable mentor, but he wouldn't be the first goaltender to see his confidence rattled by a scattered system offered up by the Sabres.

The top prospect of the 2021 draft, Owen Power has met all the lofty expectations placed upon him, if not exceeded them. Power's unorthodox choice to play an extra season in the NCAA after being drafted proved useful to his development, as he used his sophomore season at Michigan to refine his offensive toolbox and add some more polish to his game. Power's choice to wait a bit longer to join the Sabres also allowed him to take part in the Beijing Winter Olympics, where he represented Canada and looked the part playing against some of the best players outside the NHL. By the time he stepped into the Sabres' lineup in the spring of 2022, Power looked comfortable on NHL ice and found himself ready to weather the challenges of being a minute-eating defenseman at the game's highest level. Power's size is what most immediately sticks out to observers and forwards looking to score when he's on the ice. Standing at six-foot-six, Power's size allows him to impose himself on puck carriers and interrupt their plans in his zone. Power has exceptional reach and that reach when combined with his size and hockey IQ gives him a strong floor to work with as an NHL prospect. Even if his NCAA scoring doesn't translate to the professional game, he should still be able to have

a career as a high-end defensive defenseman. But, thankfully for the Sabres, Power has a strong chance to become a difference-maker offensively as well. Power is an extremely good skater for someone of his size, and his skating and exceptional on-ice vision help the Sabres' transition game immediately next season. If Power can continue to grow more comfortable with the puck on his stick, he should be able to become a do-it-all top-of-the-lineup number-one defenseman. - EH

The 8th overall selection in the 2020 NHL Draft, Jack Quinn has emerged as one of top prospects outside of the NHL after a dominating performance in the AHL this past season. The former Ottawa 67 hasn't had the easiest ride to prospect stardom, but not all paths to the NHL are created equally. After a breakout OHL campaign that saw him earn a spot in the top 10 of the 2020 draft, Quinn had a rough start to his pro career during the 2020-21 season, when the pandemic forced the cancellation of the OHL season, pushing him into an AHL role likely before he was ready. Inconsistent performance and a season ending hernia injury mired that season. However, just as he had done during

his OHL career, Quinn made the necessary adjustments to find success and this has him positioned for a full time NHL role this coming season. Two of Quinn's best assets are his shot and his on-ice awareness. He is fantastic at finding space inside the offensive zone, positioning himself for quality scoring chances. This, in combination with his great shot, makes him a terrific complementary player to pair with a quality playmaking center. However, Quinn proved this year that he can create his own chances at the pro level by improving his explosiveness and confidence with the puck. He was often the primary play driver for Rochester, and this should have Sabres fans excited about his potential as an offensive star. Furthermore, he is more than just a one-dimensional offensive player. He excels in all three zones and his high IQ allows him to be a terrific defensive player too. As long as he can avoid injury (a lower body injury prevented him from emerging as a full time NHL'er late last season), Quinn should be a lock to be in the NHL this year. - BO

Savoie is one of those players that is impossible to not root for when you watch him play. He makes up for his lack of stature with an entertaining package of slick puck skill, high-end hockey IQ, an abundance of heart and an enviable fearlessness. He is difficult to defend when he has some time and space to work with, because he innately thinks the game one step ahead of his opponents and can dissect them offensively in different ways. The Winnipeg Ice successfully convinced their 1st-overall selection in the 2019 WHL Bantam Draft to join the club, eschewing a prior verbal commitment he had made to the NCAA's University of Denver, and after COVID-related detours to the AJHL and USHL in 2020-21 he finally made his full-time WHL debut in 2021-22, scoring a sparkling 90 points in 65 contests. For his efforts he was nabbed by the Buffalo Sabres in the 1st round, 9th overall, of the 2022 draft. He is still at least one full year away from NHL duty, which will be bad news for almost all of the WHL, as he will be reuniting on the Ice with fellow 2022 top prospect Conor Geekie and 2023-eligible phenom Zach Benson. It will also be the best-case situation for him health-wise, as it will allow him time to add on some much-needed muscle to better handle the physical challenges of the sport, which will be especially useful considering his love of attacking the net and lack of shyness about getting into the dirty areas. Part of the reason why the Rochester Americans were so fun to watch last year was the dynamic duo of Jack Quinn and John-Jason Peterka. The two showed tremendous chemistry together as they tore apart the AHL. Peterka ended up leading the AHL in rookie point production (68) and goals (28). If you are a history buff, it is worth noting that Peterka's 68 points were the third most all time by a U20 player in the AHL, and the first to top 60 points since Patrice Bergeron scored 61 in 2005 and Mikko Rantanen scored 60 in 2016. That is mighty impressive. This has caused Peterka to rocket up the rankings, making him one of the better young forwards currently outside of the NHL. That may not be for long. Many have him penciled into the Sabres lineup for the coming season, perhaps even as part of a "kid" line with Jack Quinn. Peterka has a skill set built for the modern NHL game. Not only is he a dynamic skater who can lead the attack or support it, but his development as a skilled puck carrier has been tremendous. Peterka is also someone who won't hurt you playing limited minutes to start (increasing his odds of making the NHL this season) because he competes hard at both ends and already has an advanced understanding of how to play without the puck. Despite posting an extremely good 941 save percentage in his draft season for the Carleton Place Canadians of the CCHL, Devon Levi had to wait until the seventh round of the 2020 draft to hear his name called, going 212th overall to the Florida Panthers. The main reason for that? While his 941 save percentage mark was elite (albeit against lower-tier competition) NHL teams seemingly cared far more about another number: 72. That's how many inches Levi stands above the ground, clocking in at just six feet tall. He's undersized by the standards modern NHL front offices apply to goalies, and as a result his future projection was cloudy. He could be an elite goalie at a lower level, sure, but would his lack of size leave him exposed at the more difficult NCAA level? In his freshman year at Northeastern University, Levi resoundingly answered that question. Levi posted a .952 save percentage and authored one of the most impressive individual seasons by any prospect this year. He already flashed that talent last year, representing Canada at the World Juniors, and now he proved it by laying waste to the college hockey landscape. Now a Buffalo Sabre, Levi's incredible performance has solidified his place as their presumed "goalie of the future." Levi's game shares a lot of similarities to another legendary college performer, Jonathan Quick. Like Quick, Levi relies on his athleticism and mobility to make saves, aggressively challenging shooters and making himself look bigger than he is. Levi's size will always bring those who question whether his game will work at the pro level, and there have been many talented junior or college goalies who flame out against more dangerous offenses. Levi's no guarantee, but there are few goalie prospects who ooze talent like Levi does. - EH

The 16th overall selection in the 2022 draft, Ostlund is one of three centres the Buffalo Sabres selected in the first round this year. Buffalo has now selected a player from Sweden in back-to-back first rounds after selecting Isak Rosen last year. Ostlund should be considered a two-way centre, as he excels at both ends of the ice. He is agile and has a smooth skating stride with four-way mobility. He is strong in the faceoff circle and on both special teams. His calling card on offence is his strong playmaking ability. He is a menace in transition using his silky hands and smooth stride to weave through defenders. When he is given time and space, Ostlund will draw the opposition's attention and wait for a passing lane to open up before rifling the puck to a teammate. The concern with Ostlund is his lack of size and strength, which could affect his ability to play down the middle over the long run. If he can add strength, Ostlund could be a staple down the middle for the Sabres in the near future. At worst, he projects to be a middle-six playmaking forward with the ability to contribute on both special team units. Selected #33 overall by Buffalo Sabres, Prokhor Poltapov continues to show steady progression. This year he has played for the Russian U-25 national team and for CSKA (KHL). Thus far, playing against men (last year and this year), Poltapov has proven to be an effective player because of his ability to work below the goal line and his high skill level. However, it is also obvious that he still needs to get stronger to perform well at higher levels. Poltapov is a proactive player with great hockey sense who can compete effectively at both ends of the ice. A competitive goal scorer, he also possesses a strong shot and scoring instincts. Poltapov battles hard for the puck, especially in the offensive zone, and is solid in the corners and behind the net. He shows great potential physically against his peers. He protects the puck extremely well and is difficult to knock off stride. While Poltapov has to be considered a mobile player with good agility, he could still stand to improve his quickness. His KHL contract ends after the 2024-25 season, which means that he will continue to develop in Russia until then. However, this will give him the chance to be a strong pro player even before coming to North America, meaning that at that time, he could step right into an NHL lineup and be an effective role player. Rosen was selected 14th overall by the Buffalo Sabres in the 2021 NHL draft. He is a speedy winger who possesses a lethal shot, good puck handling skills, and strong playmaking ability. Rosen's skating stride is textbook, as he is light on his feet with good ankle flexion and the ability to stop and pivot on a dime. He combines his skating stride with elite hands, allowing him to have plenty of success in transition. If you give Rosen enough space, he will hurt you with his scoring ability. One of the best pure scorers in last year's draft, Rosen can beat you with a wrister or one-timer. When Rosen shoots, he has immaculate accuracy. If you give him too much time and space, he will find a way to put it in the back of the net. Last season, Rosen spent the majority of his time in the SHL in a sheltered bottom-six role where, considering the ice-time limitations, he was still able to put up 4 points in 28 games. When Rosen played in the J20 league with a larger role, he produced 4 goals and 9 points in 8 games. His first pro season in 2020 was a near write-off as he attempted to return following offseason hip surgery. Then each of the last two seasons have also seen him battle various other injuries. However, last year was unquestionably his most promising as a pro. He performed extremely well in the NHL for the Sabres...before ultimately suffering a lower body injury that kept him out for a month. Upon returning to Rochester after the injury, he was not nearly as successful either. Without question, Luukkonen is talented enough to be an NHL netminder. He proved that this past year. He has the size. He has the athleticism. He reads the play well and competes for angles. There is a reason why he dominated the OHL and the World Juniors not too long ago. However, with each accumulating injury, you have to worry about Luukkonen's long-term health and ability to succeed. First, and foremost, staying healthy will be important this season. The Sabres signed Eric Comrie from Winnipeg to split time with Craig Anderson in the Buffalo crease, putting less pressure on UPL. However, it seems likely that he sees some NHL action this year, even if only as an injury fill in. With Devon Levi knocking on the door as the Sabres goalie of the future, Luukkonen likely has a limited window to prove that he still deserves to be in that discussion. - BO

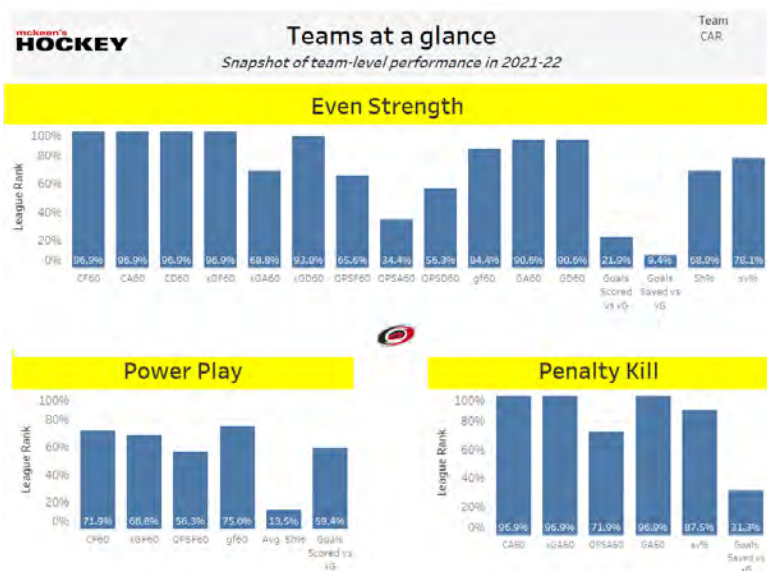

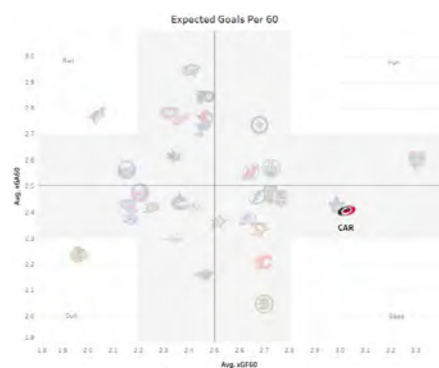

Special teams weren't that far behind, except for a deflated shooting percentage while on the powerplay that could have been even more dangerous. The penalty kill – as stingy as exemplified – was really known for its aggressive offensive transitional counter measures, dubbed 'power kill'.

TEAM: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

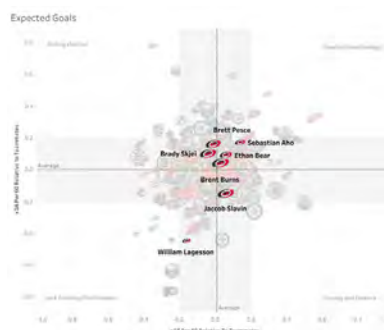

Goaltending toppled in the postseason and the team suffered, so questions arising from health in the crease can alter the results in 2022-23.

DEFENSE: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

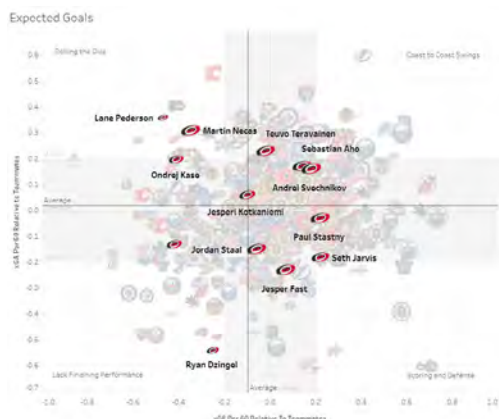

FORWARDS: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

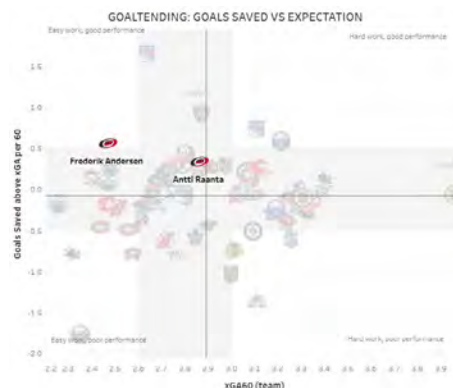

Repeating the regular season considering the make up of the team is likely, however, the postseason results from 2021-22 should make the club wary to keep a solid stable of goalies on hand, in case of injury.

The 24-year-old center has been Mr. Everything for the Hurricanes since joining the team back in 2016, leading the team in most statistical categories while producing at a point-per-game clip for the fourth year in a row. He has gone from the team's best offensive player to their do-it-all player, frequently playing over 20 minutes a night and getting the matchups usually reserved for Jordan Staal. This includes heavy usage on the penalty kill, an area where he isn't afraid to push for offense. He embodies Carolina's tenacious playing style. Looking to pressure and forecheck first but will create if the opportunity presents itself. His explosive skating and great vision give him plenty chances to do this but his knack for goal-scoring is what sets him apart. Whether it's from the bumper spot or in front of the net, Aho was a pain for goaltenders, potting a career high 37 goals with 13 of them coming on the power play. Game-breakers come in different packages and while Aho creates a lot in transition, most of his goal-scoring comes off "ugly" plays. He will always find a way to make space for himself off a cycle, get to a loose puck in the crease or get a decent one-time off from an awkward angle. This makes him the Hurricanes MVP when considering everything else he brings to the table.

Even after a 30-goal season, it felt like he left some offense on the table due to goalposts or poor finishing luck, both from him and his linemates. Creating offense has been so effortless for him since he came into the league and as he gets stronger, it's been easy for him to get a step on defenders off the rush or winning a battle in front of the net. His underlying stats reflect this, as he is one of the best players in the league at creating scoring chances and high danger passes. It's plausible to think there's

another level to Svechnikov's game when taking this into account, especially with scoring increasing across the league. Right now, he's in that upper echelon of players but inconsistent scoring along with his habit of taking countless undisciplined stick penalties keep him from the elite tier. He could easily be the best player on the Hurricanes by this time next year, as it only takes one stretch where everything clicks to break that glass ceiling.

Sometimes good players benefit from playing in great situations and that was the case for Teravainen, scoring 9 power play goals from the right circle as PKs focused on Aho and getting plenty of lay-up scoring chances from Svechnikov. Primarily known as a playmaker and someone you'd have to beg to shoot the puck, Teravainen regained some of his goal-scoring touch and made the most of getting to play with some talented linemates. It's nothing out of the ordinary for him, as he's usually Aho's wingman but his role is more about giving his linemates space, quick passes from the boards and great defensive positioning rather than highlight reel goals. As one of the smartest and longest tenured players on the team, Teravainen can probably excel in any role coach Brind'Amour puts him in. He might be leaned on for more goal-scoring now with Trocheck and Niederreiter going out the door and Pacioretty not available until February. Some of the extra offense they got from Teravainen came at the expense of his

usually elite defensive play, which is a sacrifice the Hurricanes might be willing to make if they need him to be more than just the steady, complementary piece on the top line.

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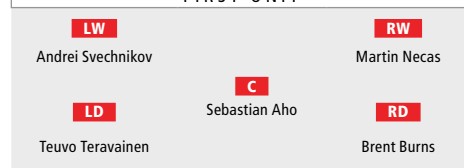

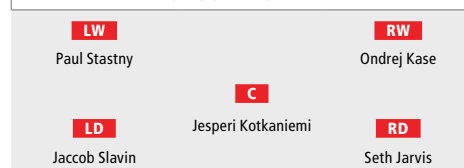
When healthy, Pacioretty is exactly what the Hurricanes needed in the playoffs. A winger who can give them an "easy" goal while being a fit for the team's forechecking system. Unfortunately, they won't have him in their lineup for the first four months of the season, as he will be recovering from a torn Achilles tendon. This is after a season where he was limited to only 39 games after a foot injury in October and wrist surgery in December. Scoring only seven goals in the 22 games after surgery, it's fair to wonder if he is still has the power behind his shot that made him such a coveted goal-scorer. Not that players haven't recovered from injuries before, but the Hurricanes will only have Pacioretty for this season and need an immediate impact out of him. We saw him adjust after the injury, scoring most of his goals from close range or off deflections instead of the perimeter and finding sneaky ways to get himself open. Carolina was a perfect match for him on paper, as they're a team that dominates the territorial play and needs more finish. Pacioretty should give that to them in theory, but they will need to wait awhile before seeing it in action.

Everyone knows what they're getting with Brent Burns, so the two questions heading into this year are how much he will play and how will switching teams effect his point total. The big change with him over the last two years is that his shot volume totals have plummeted, which in turn hurt his counting stats. Burns production has declined along with the Sharks play and now he's going to a team notorious for spending most of the game in the offensive zone. Logic suggests that Burns will see a bit of a return to form, as his puck skills haven't declined as much as his point totals suggest. Burns was still one of the better blue-liners in the league at setting up scoring chances, creating offense off the rush and exiting the zone. The only thing that has been missing is the shot volume and ability to command the offensive zone like he did in the Sharks heyday. Will that change with the Hurricanes and their strong forecheck, or will it be similar to last year with the Sharks as the Canes have seen some of their forward talent leave via free agency? It will be interesting to see this work in action. He brings a similar profile to what they had in both Dougie Hamilton and Tony DeAngelo but is much older with two careers worth of ice-time on his tires.

A beacon of consistency, Paul Stastny is a player who can always pencil in for at least 40 points most years. He is coming off one of his more productive seasons in recent memory, hitting the 20-goal mark for the first time since 2014. The 16-year veteran wore a lot of hats for the Jets, playing on both special teams' units and providing some stability in the middle of their lineup. He played on the wing alongside Mark Scheifele, showing his versatility and his value as a complementary piece. Stastny's never been a fast player to begin with, relying on his vision and smarts to get by, so he's been able to age more gracefully than other players. It's allowed him to be one of the better play-driving centers in the league even in his late 30's, letting his linemates do most of the work with the puck while he drives the middle or looks for a soft spot in the defense. He plays more of a "passenger" role based on how often he has the puck but does a lot of good work away from it to make things easier for his linemates. Also has the hands to make creative, quick plays in short areas. He's a nice fit for the Hurricanes at only \$1.5 million and should replace some of what they lost in Vincent Trocheck.

The modern-day shutdown defenseman, Slavin is the type of player who could put up zero points and still have a positive impact. There are few players in the league who are as good at skating forwards into a corner or using their stick as him. He also covers a ton of ground in the defensive zone, disrupting most plays before they even start and quickly getting the puck out of the zone to relieve pressure. He was tasked with more of an offensive role last year with Tony DeAngelo as his partner. He ended up having a career year in points and showed some real upside there, especially with shooting for deflections and making soft passes to the front of the net from the left point. It was the most growth he has shown in that part of the game, at least at even strength, running the power play is something he hasn't quite figured out yet. While he didn't play pure shutdown minutes, Slavin still played 23-25 minutes a night and was the Jenga piece for Carolina's blue line. If he had an off night, it was usually bad news for the Canes. Those were few and far between though as he had a stellar season and adapted to playing in more offensive situations. This should continue next year with the roving Brent Burns projected to be his defense partner.

2021-22 was a revival for Skjei and it came out of nowhere. After seemingly topping out as a low-end 4/5 defenseman, he had a career year offensively and posted some of his best underlying stats since his rookie year. All awhile playing a tough shutdown role with Brett Pesce. The Hurricanes have done well to make the game easier for Skjei, giving him the greenlight to join the rush and allowing him to stand up at the line with Pesce or a forward backing him up if he gets beat. His size and skating were always going to be his calling cards and translating it to game situations was the challenge. This started to come around last year, he had a career season offensively and looked like a threat to score instead of someone who would spam low percentage shots from the boards. The high-risk nature of his game is still an issue, but it's something the Hurricanes are more content with now that they're seeing the rewards. It gives the Hurricanes second pair a different look even though their primary job is shutting down top lines. Skjei's aggressive nature and playing style was a big part of that with how often he would pinch to keep pucks in, push for offense or quickly re-enter the zone after a long shift. He had 39 points with zero power play time last year, so he could challenge for a spot on the second unit if Slavin continues to struggle there.

Looking at Brett Pesce's profile and watching him play is quite the contrast. He's tall but not towering, has a good frame but isn't physically intimidating. His shot isn't very powerful, a great skater with good edges but not a burner like Cale Makar. He looks like someone who would top out as a depth defenseman at the NHL level, but he is one of the better shutdown defenders in the league. Playing a pure defensive role with Brady Skjei for the past two years has been up-and-down for him. He can still break-up plays at the blue line better than most and can skate his way out of pressure. His defensive impact, however, usually varies depending on who he is paired with. A predictable partner like Slavin or Calvin de Haan will yield good results for him while a more aggressive,

roaming partner like Skjei or Edmundson will leave him covering for more mistakes and sometimes it's too much for him to handle. This was the case for him at times last year, but history suggests that he will rebound and return to the reliable defender he was for most of his career. A down year for him is a good year for most in the league.

When Carolina opted to jettison all their existing goaltenders in favor of a pair of over-thirty veterans with lengthy injury histories, it seemed hard to put big money down in favor of a successful Hurricanes year; after all, it would only take one ill-timed pair of injuries to both Frederik Andersen and Antti Raanta for the team to find themselves out in the wind with the playoffs on the line. Luckily, the gamble worked out in their favor – and while neither vet had been willing to sign on a year-by-year basis, Andersen's year was impressive enough to feel comfortable with him coming back for yet another season with the Metropolitan Division club. At 32-years old, Andersen .922 unadjusted save percentage and four shutouts were good for a whopping 35 team wins and the goaltender's best statistical season since his rookie year. Very few goaltenders are able to do a complete one-eighty after struggling as hard as Andersen did during his final year in Toronto – but whatever

Carolina did clearly worked. After a year of watching the Danish netminder struggle to accurately read shot rebounds and recover comfortably in order to face second shots, Andersen's sharp instincts looked good as new during the 2021-22 season. He didn't change much about his core style – he remained a goaltender who seems most comfortable pushing forward into shots and holding down the fort with clear sightlines instead of asking his defense to crowd his crease, with a preference for cutting down open space instead of waiting out shooters. But instead of fighting against the defensive system in front of him, which he seemed to be almost forced to do during his tenure in Toronto, he was able to play to his strengths with the Hurricanes and hit his stride. His only negative was the lack of consistency he posted; despite having some of the league's best numbers, his quality start percentage sat just a hair above the average. But as long as he's able to truly split the net with tandem partner Antti Raanta, which should prevent the more-consistent Finnish veteran from suffering more injuries, that shouldn't be a big enough problem to hurt the Hurricanes in their push to hit the Stanley Cup Final.

After nearly a decade in the NHL, it seems fair to say that Antti Raanta is a known entity in net. The 33-year-old former Blackhawks, Rangers, and Coyotes

backstop remains one of the NHL's most reliable goaltenders from a performance standpoint – so long as you don't need him to hold down the fort entirely on his own for lengthy periods of time. Even when playing a true tandem with Frederik Andersen, Raanta suffered a slew of minor injuries that kept him out of games and left Andersen to man the pipes without him. As Carolina seems to have figured out, though, Raanta still provides incredible value in a tandem situation. He didn't put up quite the same level save percentage that Andersen did during his 28 regular season games with the Hurricanes, but that was more a byproduct of his consistency than it was a problem with his quality of performance. His quality start percentage matched Andersen's nearly perfectly, and he only posted one start that classified as a Really Bad Start using Rob Vollman's metric (which calculates the percentage of starts a goaltender actively inhibits his team's chance of winning a game, recording a save percentage below 85%). In comparison, Andersen – who played in just under double the number of games Raanta did – posted five Really Bad Starts; while Andersen clearly posted higher highs than Raanta, he also posted lower lows. That's a benefit of the structured, utilitarian style that Raanta plays; despite being one of the smallest goaltenders in the league, he keeps his skates within the blue paint and relies on patience to goad shooters into showing their hands before he drops to his knees. He lacks some of the high-end speed and lower body power that would likely push him into elite territory, particularly now that he's so prone to lower-body bumps and bruises. But despite a game that doesn't particularly challenge the Andrei Vasilevskiys and Igor Shesterkins of the league, his baseline remains incredibly strong – and best of all, he knows exactly what he is and what he's capable of. Raanta's spatial awareness sits among some of the best in the league, which gives him enough of an advantage to allow him to slow his game down a bit to ease up on his hips and groin. He may not be a sure bet as a reliable split-share netminder anymore, but he's unlikely to hurt Carolina much, either.

It was quite the whirlwind year for Kochetkov, a former second round pick of the Hurricanes. He started the year in the KHL, where he performed well. Then he came over to North America in March to play in the AHL...where he performed well. This was followed by the necessity of Kochetkov being thrown into a handful of starts in the NHL playoffs for Carolina due to injuries to both Freddie Andersen and Antti Raanta. Lastly, his season culminated with a reassignment to AHL Chicago (after the Hurricanes were eliminated) where he helped the Wolves capture a Calder Cup. Not too shabby for a pro debut in North America. Kochetkov has proven to be so successful thus far because of his quickness and aggressiveness in the crease. A highly agile netminder, he can afford to cut down angles aggressively because he recovers so well moving post to post and front to back. Of course, NHL goaltending coaches (like Carolina's Jason Muzzatti) will work

to refine Kochetkov's movement to make him a little quieter in the crease. However, he definitely has the make-up and resume of a topflight goaltending prospect, something that is reflected in our prospect rankings. As of right now, Kochetkov is projected to start the season in the AHL as Chicago's starting netminder because both Andersen and Raanta have recovered from their knee injuries. A full year as a starter in North America will be great for his development. With the two goalies ahead of him set to become UFA's after this coming season, it seems likely that Kochetkov is being groomed for an NHL position in 2023-24. - BO

To a certain extent, Scott Morrow's freshman season at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst was a success. He was the team's second-highest scorer and flashed the sort of offensive talent that isn't commonly seen in defensemen, let alone defensemen who fall to the second round of the NHL draft. Morrow is a creative problem-solver in the offensive zone, acting with decisiveness and conviction when he has a chance in mind that he wants to create. For someone of his size (six-foot-two-, 195 pounds) Morrow moves very well and has definite upside as a transition defenseman in the NHL. He can deftly sift his way through traffic to facilitate zone entries, and the way he uses his big frame to protect the puck while he's carrying it through the neutral zone is absolutely notable. Morrow's offensive game is strong enough that he has the upside to eventually become a power play quarterback in the NHL. But while the offensive side to Morrow's game is quite promising and developed, it's the defensive side of his game that could hold him back. Morrow isn't a physical player yet, and his reads in the defensive zone need improvement. There's a great canvas of tools for an NHL development staff to work with in improving Morrow's all-around game, but he'll need to possibly make sacrifices in his offense in order to get there. If he can make some adjustments to make his game more sustainable and well-rounded, Morrow can become an extremely impactful NHL defenseman. If he remains an aggressive, risk-taking offensive force, he'll still get his NHL chances, and could become a power-play specialist at the next level if no defensive development occurs. - EH

The son of former NHL'er Ted Drury, and the nephew of current New York Rangers General Manager Chris Drury, Jack was excellent in his first AHL season last year. He was among the rookie scoring leaders during the regular season and then took his game to another level in the playoffs, averaging over a point per game in helping the Wolves capture the Calder Cup. Drury was even rewarded with a brief NHL call up that saw him score in both contests, while playing key minutes on the penalty kill. At this point, he seems destined to be a long-time middle six player for the Hurricanes thanks to his well-rounded skill set. There really isn't anything that Drury does not do well, and this gives him such great versatility as a player. His coaches can employ him in any situation. With several openings in their bottom six this coming year, it seems likely that he will be a full time NHL player. Carolina believes that someone like Drury can replace Vincent Trocheck and Nino Niederreiter internally and on a cheap entry level contract, helping them to alleviate any cap concerns that they might have. One has to wonder if the Hurricanes see Drury as a replacement for pending UFA Jordan Staal in a year's time if he performs admirably this year. - BO

It's amazing how much can change in just one year and Alexander Nikishin is a perfect example of it: on year ago, in August of 2021, the biggest concerns regarding the blueliner revolved around his cardiac abnormalities, which he had to overcome to be able to play regular hockey and have a chance to establish himself as a full-time KHL player, but he did all of that and much more. Over 2021-22, Nikishin has become the top young defenseman in the KHL and even earned himself an Olympic invitation, where he won a silver medal. In the offseason he was the main part of a blockbuster KHL trade in which the powerhouse SKA traded nine (nine!!!) player assets for him including some of their top prospects. For Hurricanes fans this trade had some negative side effects, as it was announced that Nikishin will not only earn notably more money now, but also will add one more year to his contract length, locking him to the KHL through the 2024/25 season. That said, he will be only 23 when he frees up and with the way he is developing we can expect him to become a reliable hard-hitting top-4 D with some nice attacking abilities including a hard shot and a solid first pass. Until then, playing for a top KHL contender would give Nikishin a chance to push his game to new heights. - VF

Luck has not been on Ryan Suzuki's side since the Hurricanes selected him in the first round of the 2019 draft. The year after being drafted, Suzuki suffered a significant eye injury that has left him with a permanent blind spot in that injured eye. Then the pandemic happened, and Suzuki was thrust into the AHL in a limited role, rather than starring for the OHL in his final year of junior eligibility. Last season, injuries plagued him yet again, limiting him to only 34 games. This included him missing the entire Calder Cup playoffs. The younger brother of Montreal Canadiens young star Nick, 21-year-old Ryan is far too young to give up on as a serious NHL prospect. Ryan is actually a better skater than his older brother and he possesses the same kind of passing touch and sense in the offensive zone. Despite battling injuries, he has taken steps forward to become a better and more engaged player without the puck. That said, the younger Suzuki's calling card will be his ability to play as a top six center who can make plays with the puck for his wingers and push the pace of play. Until he stays healthy and emerges as a top producer at the AHL level, he likely will not push for a spot on the Hurricanes. Patience will be key here for Carolina and their development staff. - BO

Gleb Trikozov, selected No. 60 by the Carolina Hurricanes, had a remarkable second half of the season. He looked incredible in the MHL (Russia's 1st youth league) playoffs, helping his team make a deep run. A decent sized forward, Trikozov has an effective offensive game, good hockey sense and skill. His skating is great, and he uses it effectively, especially in assisting in zone entries for his team. His explosiveness with the puck is also excellent. Without the puck, Trikozov constantly applies pressure, but could stand to play a little more physically to help him secure turnovers. Offensively he is calm and patient. This helps him maintain possession deep into the offensive zone. Trikozov is also a strong shooter. He often moves to the right before he shoots; his size allows him to create separation from his opponent in two steps, creating a good shooting lane. He effectively finds free space in the offensive zone, reacting and adapting to the play smartly. Moving forward it will be about proving himself at the higher levels in Russia before making the jump to North America. Adding strength and improving his ability to utilize his teammates are key next steps. Look for him to split this year between the VHL, MHL, and KHL. - DB

Adept with the puck, he avoids crumbling under pressure and makes it hard on opponents to separate him from the puck. Whereas continued practice and the addition of leg and lower body strength will surely have a very positive effect on his skating, he's still a ways away from possessing the type of skating that would allow him to make effective use of his skills at the NHL level. Intensity and conditioning over 60 minutes will need to improve as well, but there's plenty of time for the young winger. In light of the importance of Sebastian Aho and Teuvo Teravainen for the Canes, it's no wonder that the team enjoys success in selecting the few Finns is adds every couple of drafts. - CL

A 2021 second round selection of the Carolina Hurricanes, Heimosalmi has continued in his development where he left off at the 2021 U18 Worlds, where he was named the tournament's top defender thanks to his two goal, eight point effort over seven games. Although his role was often quite small, he spent this past season entirely in Liiga action, learning many of the nuances of professional play. Those lessons were on full display in this summer's WJC as he put up a goal, seven points, and a +4 on his way to gaining a silver medal. There, he showed great edges, a strong command of the puck all along the blue line, and a keen ability to conduct productive transitions. His skating ability allows him to be highly effective in defending without having to overexert himself physically. The Hurricanes were all about accumulating bodies at the 2021 NHL draft, even moving back out of the first round to grab more darts in the second, where they selected Heimosalmi and fellow Finn Ville Koivunen. Both have continued to look like steals to date. For Heimosalmi, who is still under contract with Ässät, the key this season will be to take on more responsibility for his club team, ultimately exerting more of his exceptional talent along the opposition blue line. His fantastic skating and stickhandling

will be his calling card moving forward, but he'll need to continue adding strength every step of the way so as to avoid the kind of role he had last season. Having made 40 selections over the past four drafts, the Hurricanes have a stacked prospect bin and will happily give Heimosalmi all the time he needs. The hopes are high that he'll one day be a prime transitional defenseman at the NHL level. - CL

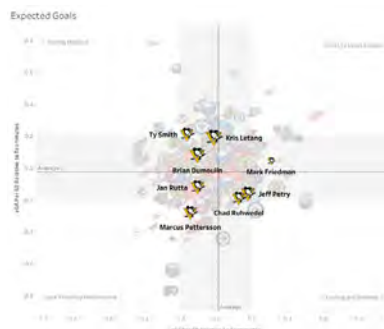

DEFENSE: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

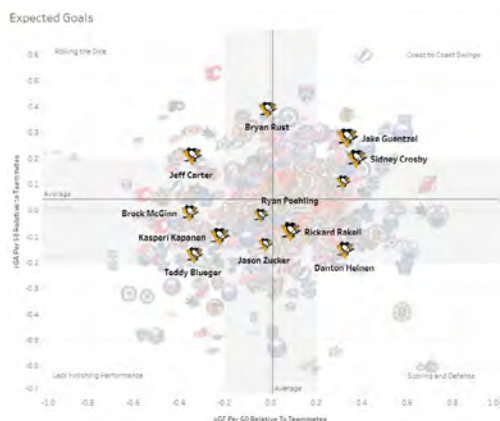

FORWARDS: EXPECTED GOAL RATES

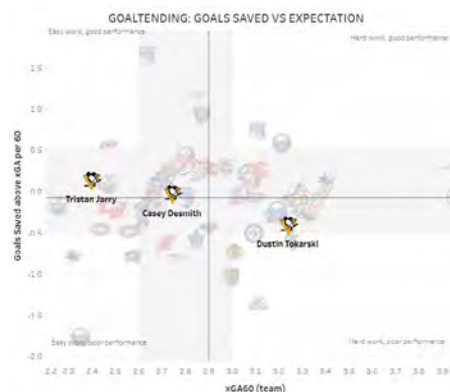

Sidney Crosby opted for surgery in September of 2021 in order to address a nagging wrist injury that had been bothering him over the course of several years. He did not make his season debut until October 30th and went into the Covid-19 protocol immediately after, delaying his full return until mid-November. Having to play a bit of catchup with timing and conditioning post-surgery, Crosby scored just four goals through his first 18 games and was off to a bit of a slower start than usual. What followed was a tear of 27 goals in 53 games and a 1.35 points per game pace to end the season. Crosby has never finished a year below a point-per-game average, and it does not look like that's going to change anytime soon. With the return of some of his familiar counterparts and a clean bill of health to his name, Crosby looks to get back to usual ways of manipulating the pace of the game to create passing lanes that enable him to use his otherworldly vision and puck distribution abilities to his advantage. His connection with Jake Guentzel continues to evolve into a dynamic offensive partnership that enhances the work of both players regardless of the third wheel. While his game has evolved over time, Crosby is as lethal with the puck on his stick as he has ever been. Head coach Mike Sullivan will continue to lean on the Crosby unit for his most difficult matchups and he aims to continue to be the main distributor of the top power-play unit. Crosby's work in the boards and net front area with his low center of gravity and puck control abilities remain hallmarks of his game, while his backhand shot and pass from his flat blade continue to be as lethal as ever.

Guentzel. While his contract negotiation came down to the wire, Malkin re-signed a four-year, \$24.4 million dollar contract extension to round out the return of the Penguins core for additional runs at a Stanley Cup. Malkin's shot remains a high-powered howitzer and he continues to be a high-level puck distributor with quality puck distribution capabilities to his linemates. Power remains the essence of his game and despite his knee injuries he is still a strong skater with great lateral mobility despite some of his injuries. Malkin's ability to carry the puck in the zone successfully has taken a hit in recent years and his bullish approach with the puck on his stick may require revisiting at his age. Service time has been another concern for Malkin. He enters this season with his knee surgery behind him and a full summer of a traditional training schedule. Malkin has made it very clear that when he is in the lineup, he is a force to be reckoned with at even-strength and on the power-play. It would not be unreasonable to expect a renaissance-like season from him if he can remain healthy. It is a safe bet to assume he will remain the de-facto quarterback on the Penguins top power-play unit.

It was a season of shaking narratives for Jake Guentzel. He showed he can perform without Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin in the lineup, registering 10 points in 12 games to carry the Penguins in their absence. He also proved he can still get it done in the

playoffs, registering 10 points in seven playoff games after a string of difficult performances in years prior. It was Guentzel's second time cracking the 40-goal plateau and his first season over a point per game average. An elaborate offensive toolbox is becoming the hallmark of Guentzel's game. He boasts an underrated shot with a deceptive release, high-quality puck distribution ability and understanding of the game that enabled him to hit a career-high 44 assists last season, and most notably a ghost-like ability to remain unmarked in the offensive zone. Guentzel has become the encyclopedia example of "Hockey IQ" as he exploits the smallest areas of time and space to his advantage. Guentzel's shot-quality generation rates were 2nd on the team behind Sidney Crosby. His 1.30 goals per 60 minutes at even-strength lead all Penguins last year. His consistency in finding the scoresheet was remarkable as he registered points in 20 of 21 games through December and January of 2021-22. Guentzel will look to build off this career year and will be granted every opportunity to do so alongside Sidney Crosby on the top line and power-play unit for the Penguins. Danton Heinen is not a household name by any means, but he did a lot with a little ice time last year and controlled the game at even-strength for the Penguins. Heinen's 57% share over the raw scoring chances while he was on the ice at even-strength put him top five among Penguin forwards in that regard. A volume shooter, Heinen's approach to play was simple but effective for his first year in Pittsburgh. Heinen put up solid performances through all three zones in his debut year with Pittsburgh. His defensive play was sound, he boasted quality returns in moving the puck up ice and into the offensive zone of attack, and he ended the season on the cusp of the 20-goal mark with 18 total in all situations. Heinen returns to Pittsburgh on a one-year, \$1.1 million dollar deal that reportedly saw him take less money in the face of more lucrative offers to remain with the Penguins. Heinen did not find the scoresheet with a lot of consistency last season and went through a few dry patches, but his utility in driving play, controlling most of the scoring chances in the game, and playing sound defensive hockey make up for any lapses he experiences in the scoring department. Heinen is a safe bet to repeat or hurdle last season's performance given his environment and will continue to be used in a Swiss army knife fashion by Mike Sullivan and the coaching staff. That utility often includes appearances in the top-six forward group where he experiences success alongside Evgeni Malkin in particular.

A great summation of Kasper Kapanen's dismal 2021-22 campaign is the fact that he scored two more points than he did the prior season in 39 more games. Kapanen took a step back across the board and struggled to find the back of the net with any level of consistency. While he gained the offensive zone with possession on a frequent enough of a basis, these were often fruitless ventures that saw him miss the net on poorly selected shots, bypass opportunities passing opportunities, or simply lose possession of the puck for a turnover. It was not just that Kapanen struggled to score, it is that the peripheral statistics of play-driving and controlling the game at even-strength were also unkind to him. There was a brief reunion between Kapanen and Evgeni Malkin once the latter returned the lineup from knee surgery, but the sparks never flew from a chemistry perspective and Kapanen ended up sliding down the lineup as his goal-scoring droughts grew more and more frequent. The expectation is that Kapanen will play more of a support role outside of the top six forward group this season and that may net him a level of competition and deployment that enables him to control the play more than he did last year. A better grasp of the even-strength game would net him a greater total of scoring opportunities to work his way out of his

slump. Kapanen was brought back on a two-year contract at a \$3.2 million average per year. He will need to out-pace his performance in 2021-22 in order to make his cap value worth it.

Jeff Carter's initial impact for the Penguins upon arriving via trade from Los Angeles was stout and promising. Carter looked like a player renewed and that momentum carried over into the start of 2021-22. In the absence of Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin, Carter stormed out of the gate as the top line center and general manager Ron Hextall responded with a two-year contract extension worth a total of \$6.25 million dollars. Carter's performance took a precipitous turn downhill from that point forward. Carter spent much of his even-strength ice time hemmed in the defensive zone. There was a struggle to consistently create offense and elongate shift time spent in the offensive zone. While Carter's skating is not what it once was, it also is not a detriment to his game. He still possesses a tricky shot that is deceptive, hard, and difficult to track. Carter remains a difficult element to manage in front of the net and in the battle areas of the ice. He did not play a major role transitioning the puck out of the defensive zone or into the offensive zone. At his peak, Carter is a strong element on the cycle that can still take advantage of shooting opportunities in a variety of locations of the ice. The issue remains that his ability to control the play at even-strength has diminished in a significant fashion. Carter heads into the 2022-23 season at 38 years old. While he will not need to serve in the elevated role required of him last year due to injury, there's hope that he can level his performance with mitigated minutes and sensical deployments.

It was a renaissance year for Kris Letang on the blueline for the Penguins. He set career highs in assists with 58 and total points with 68. He finished

seventh in Norris Trophy voting in his 16th year in the National Hockey League. Letang managed his highest ice time averages since the 2018-19 season and showcased his high levels of conditioning by playing over 25 minutes per night on average. Letang shot the puck a lot more than usual last year and landed among the top ten defensemen in the league with regards to gross shot volume, seemingly sacrificing power for accuracy in his shots to achieve that result. Despite the difficult nature of his deployments, Letang was able to control shot-attempts and raw scoring chances with a high level of regularity. A priority for management in the offseason, Letang signed a six-year contract worth a total of \$36.6 million dollars that will likely round out his career as a member of the Penguins. Expect Letang to continue to be used in high leverage situations with a great deal of confidence from the coaching staff. He orchestrates most of the movement up ice on the breakout of the power-play. Letang's skating is still the backbone of his game, and it enables him to take risks offensively and provide positive impacts to the teams' offensive outputs as a result of that mobility and chance-taking. Letang's defensive work in transition is not what it was once, but he maintains an aggressive gap in one-on-one situations. Letang shows no signs of slowing down and his training regimen has enabled him to play 78 games last season despite his big minutes.

Jeff Petry makes his way to Pittsburgh via a trade that sent defenseman Mike Matheson and a fourth-round pick to the Montreal Canadiens for Petry and forward Ryan Poehling. The Penguins wanted to get bigger and more physical on the blueline and they accomplish that in Petry without having to sacrifice anything in the way of offense. Landscape wise, it is going to be a much different environment for Petry. He will likely feature in similar role at even-strength, playing a puck carrying role on the second defensive pairing. While he does not produce the same type of elite play-driving offensive results he once did, he is still extremely competent with the puck on his stick and is a boost to the teams' offensive goals. He will have an opportunity to work steadily alongside Evgeni Malkin's unit, giving him a high-quality offensive-minded center to work with. A potential partnership between Petry and Marcus Pettersson would give Petry a steady, defensive-minded partner to enable him to focus on offensive outputs and carrying the puck on the breakout. Petry is coming off a year where his goal-scoring and offensive performance took a hit. A new landscape should bring about a return to success offensively. He still has a powerful, accurate shot that he uses with a high level of regularity and will sneak low into the offensive zone to put it to use. Petry is still a strong skater that can defend forwards

off the rush with a great deal of success. The Penguins will look for him to use his size to provide a stern presence in the home plate area of the net.

Brian Dumoulin will be returning to the lineup having suffered an MCL injury in the playoffs. That is a notable mention because Dumoulin has suffered a variety of lower body injuries over the course of the last several years that have seemingly impacted his mobility and ability to keep a strong gap in defensive coverage. Dumoulin's hallmark, a strong style of skating with great individual defensive coverage in the neutral and defensive zones, has taken a hit over time and attrition has made its mark in his game. For the first time last season, Dumoulin was removed from Kris Letang's side on the Penguins top defensive pairing. While that may not be a true harbinger of things to come, it is a testament to the theory that something seemed a bit off with the Penguins defensive guru last season. Dumoulin will look to enter the year healthy and shake some of the nagging problems that have bothered him over the course of the last few years. At his best, he is still a wet blanket over the other team's best offensive forwards. His patient and reliable approach to defense enables his more offensively gifted counterparts to take chances and risks in the offensive zone. Dumoulin is not afraid to use the body, but physicality has never been the backbone of his defensive game. His strong skating and pivot-ability in transition, combined with his long reach and active stick, make him a difficult player to move past for transitioning forwards. Those will be the elements Dumoulin looks to recapture as last year was an inconsistent performance from in him protecting his own blueline.

Marcus Pettersson is becoming the Penguins even-strength defensive specialist. While his game lacks a lot of flash and offensive utility, Pettersson produces great returns in preventing defensive zone entries from opposing forwards and can competently move the puck into the hands of safety. His strong

skating and heads-up approach to the game in the defensive and neutral zones gave him the ability to control the game at even-strength last season. Pettersson controlled over 54 percent of the quality shots taken while he was on the ice at even-strength. His offensive skills have never been the focal point of his game, but he is a competent passer who can handle and distribute the puck adequately enough to find himself in the assist column on a regular basis. Pettersson's hallmarks are a strong defensive gap that he uses to keep opposing forwards in front of him. He is a strong transition skater and can manage quick changes from offense to defense in a hurry without losing himself in the fray of the game. He has a good shot that is accurate and well-placed albeit used infrequently. Pettersson took on an elevated role in the post-season from an ice time perspective and that may be a harbinger of things to come with Jeff Petry in the fold alongside him. While lacking the pizzazz of some of his counterparts, Pettersson brings a unique and necessary defensive-minded focus to the Penguins defensive core that is more well-known for its ability to join the rush and play offense.

Every year, it seems like there's a tertiary storyline floating around the NHL theorizing that this season will be the final season of Pittsburgh's Crosby-Malkin window. But while they certainly don't have Vezina-caliber goaltending at the helm under now-established starter Tristan Jarry, the Surrey, BC native certainly doesn't get enough credit for what he does for the team. Jarry has quietly racked up six years in net for the Penguins now, logging his heaviest workload yet this past year and performing perfectly up to expectations in the process. He quieted concerns that he was following the Matt Murray decline timeline by bouncing back soundly from his mediocre 2020-21 season, posting a .919 save percentage and logging quality starts in over 62 percent of his games. The biggest contributor to his return to form was his consistency; while he had been sitting well above average in his quality start percentage the year prior as well, Jarry eliminated the stretches of poor performances by seeming to clean up his ability to get rattled by bad goals. He posted one fewer game with a sub-.850 save percentage than he had recorded the year prior, despite playing in nearly twenty more games – and while a closer look at his overall numbers from the last few seasons reveals that he never fell out of the top half of performers in the league, he shot back into the top ten with the outcomes he posted last year in particular. Now, he'll get a chance to show that he can repeat that success for the Penguins this year, which could be one of the last years that Casey DeSmith backs him up before the team potentially takes a look at what a younger option like Joel Blomqvist to be his number two.

To describe Pickering's progress and development over the past few years as "stratospheric" would still be something of an understatement. After all, it's not often that you see a prospect get picked as late as the 9th round of the WHL Bantam Draft only to get selected in the 1st round of the NHL Entry Draft three years later. Even more amazing, the 6'5" defender still seems like he's just scratching the surface of what he can accomplish and how good he can ultimately become. Growing up, he honed his mobility and puck control as an undersized blueliner, but he didn't lose those skills as he underwent a massive growth spurt in his mid-teens. While he is still filling into his new body right now, defensemen with his combination of size and mobility are hot commodities, so the Pens are likely thrilled to have landed Pickering at 21st overall in 2022. He moves around the ice effortlessly; he is comfortable having the puck on his stick in full flight and he thinks the game reasonably well in all three zones. While he might not currently be as polished as some other top prospects, his Swift Current team is rebuilding and is already giving him loads of ice time in all situations as their number-one defenseman. That kind of role and workload should be a big boon to his long-term development, getting the reps that will help him gain experience. The Broncos are also primed for big playoff pushes in the upcoming years, which will provide him with valuable learning opportunities. Few prospects have the raw, unrefined potential that Pickering possesses, and that will make him a fascinating player to continue following as his career moves forward. - DN

The powerhouse Penguins haven't drafted in the first round very much in recent years, but Poulin is one of those rare selections (from 2019). His first pro season last year has to be considered a successful one. Upon first glance, his point totals likely won't excite you, but his 37 points actually placed him second in scoring on a low scoring Wilkes-Barre team. The stocky power winger was able to translate his high energy, pesky game to the pro level rather seamlessly. He is always in attack mode, hungry for the puck on the forecheck and backcheck. Poulin is more than just a run of the mill checker, though. He can attack the offensive zone with pace and create off the rush with soft hands. His strength on the puck is one of his best qualities as he can be difficult to knock off stride and separate from the puck. Poulin also has a goal scorer's touch, especially in tight. He projects as a versatile middle six winger who can play in any situation for the Penguins in the future, perhaps even working alongside Sidney Crosby at some point in the twilight of his career. However, that is not likely to be next season given the Penguins depth at forward. Poulin will return to Wilkes-Barre for another season, hopefully improving his offensive production further. He should then be ready for a full-time gig in 2023-24, just in time for several middle six contracts to come off the books in Pittsburgh. - BO

Pittsburgh's 2nd round selection in 2020, Blomqvist has spent two straight seasons seeing fairly limited time in Liiga play while racking up outstanding GAAs and save percentages. After his initial pro season in Finland in 20-21 saw most of his playing time and success coming in second tier Mestis, he saw his role grow with Kärpät this season, ultimately climaxing in the postseason during which he accumulated an astronomical 1.10 GAA and .950 save percentage over seven games, which followed a 1.32 GAA and .940 save percentage in 20 regular season contests. He ended the season with a single game cameo for Pittsburgh's AHL affiliate. Although not terribly large, he makes the most out of his 6'2" frame. A thinking man's goaltender, Blomqvist stands out for being calm and controlled in his movements. His technical skills indicate that he's very well-schooled. His performances have been very consistent thanks to strong composure, puck-tracking abilities, and a fantastically accurate understanding of when to commit himself in making his saves. Blomqvist remains unsigned at this time and is once again scheduled to suit up for Kärpät in Liiga play, with the starter's job on his plate. AN ELC with the Penguins should come soon, where he will be able to challenge fellow Finn Filip Lindberg for future time in the NHL crease. - CL

The Penguins are going to be facing quite the predicament this training camp when it comes to Joseph. The talented puck mover is no longer exempt from waivers, which means that if he does not make Pittsburgh's roster, they will have to make him available to other NHL teams. Given his pedigree as a prospect, it seems unlikely that he would pass through waivers unclaimed. A former first round selection of Arizona, he was acquired in the Phil Kessel trade in 2019. Joseph has improved in each of his three pro seasons thus far and the time is now for Pittsburgh to clear a path for him to make the big club and play regularly. His best asset is his mobility. Joseph is an extremely fluid mover whose game is completely built around his ability to cover the ice effortlessly. He is a skilled puck mover who can quarterback the powerplay and lead the attack in transition. Given the age of Pittsburgh's puck movers, it would be smart for the Penguins to see what they have in Joseph. When drafted, his defensive game and presence was a work in progress, however this has improved to the point where he is no longer a defensive liability. There would likely still be growing pains at the NHL level, however the reward is potentially worth the risk. The new one-way, two-year contract the Penguins gave Joseph this offseason points to him being a part of this team long term, but either way, he should be an NHL player next season finally. - BO

One of the keys to Pittsburgh's sustained success has been their ability to find gems later in the draft and through the undrafted free agent market. Insert 5'9 Finnish winger Valtteri Puustinen, a seventh-round selection by the Pens in 2019. After two successful Liiga campaigns, he made his North American pro debut last year and it was an extremely successful one. He led Wilkes-Barre in scoring and even caught the eye of the Penguins coaching staff in his lone NHL game following a brief call-up. Puustinen is a highly intelligent offensive player. He has a very clear understanding of how to play without the puck, sliding in and out of coverage and showing great anticipation. He also has a very strong shot that allows him to be dangerous from anywhere on the ice. The combination of these two things makes him the perfect complementary winger on a scoring line. Somewhat undersized, it will be interesting to see how Pittsburgh employs Puustinen in the future. His talents would likely be wasted in a checking line role, so look for them to wait until an opening occurs on a scoring line before they give him a true audition. Look for him to be one of Pittsburgh's top call-up options this coming season, especially if someone inside their top six goes down. - BO

Hallander only just completed his first pro season in North America, but he has had a pretty strange career already. A second-round selection by Pittsburgh in 2018, Hallander was traded to the Toronto Maple Leafs in the Kasperii Kapanen deal. A year later, the Penguins reacquired him in the famous Jared McCann deal (in which McCann was then lost to Seattle from Toronto in the expansion draft). At this point, Pens management and scouts are likely pretty certain in what they have in Hallander. His offensive upside is rather limited. He is not exceptionally skilled. His production in the SHL and at the AHL level last year prove that. However, he does have a skill set built for a bottom six role. He skates pretty well. He has positional versatility. He is very responsible defensively and can excel in a penalty killing role. The Penguins will definitely be grooming Hallander to be a bottom six player, perhaps even in a shutdown defensive role. How long it takes him to realize that potential remains to be seen. He will likely play out the entire year in the AHL in hopes of improving his confidence and ability with the puck, so that he is ready for the pace in the NHL. Pittsburgh is likely to be patient with him in hopes that he can develop a little further as an offensive player. - BO

He doesn't possess any elite skills that stand out, and although he's creative with the puck and responsible without it, there aren't many NHL regulars of his stature that don't compensate with high-end skill elsewhere. That being said, he acquitted himself well at the junior level and now is slated to move to the pro ranks in 2022-23 with the Penguins' AHL affiliate in Wilkes-Barre. He will likely need some time to adjust, and it will be interesting to see how he does playing against much bigger opponents. - AS
